**Kunsih** – KON-see  
how (many, much); when (time related)

**Lakit** – LA-kit

**Laly** – LAY-lee

thank you

**Maika** – MY-ka  
you (in the singular form)

**Mahkook** – ma-KOOK  
to buy, to sell, trade

**Mama** – MAMA  
mother

**Mamook** – ma-MOOK  
to do, to make, to prepare, to work

**Man** – MAN  
man, husband, male of any kind

**Memaloose** – MEM-a-looss  
dead; to die, expire, decay

**Mesaika** – me-SIGH-ka -  
you, yours in the plural form

**Mitlite** – MIT-lite  
to be, to live, to have, to sit, reside at

**Mitwhit** – MIT-whit  
stand, arise, be erect

**Mokst** – MOK-st  
two

**Moon** – MOON  
moon, month

**Moosum** – MOO-sum  
sleep, to sleep

**Muckamuck** – muck-a-MUCK  
food, eat, drink, chew, devour – put anything into the mouth

**Naika** – NY-ka  
I, me, my, mine

**Nanitch** – NAN-itch  
to look, see, observe, view, perceive, seek

**Nawitka** – nah-WIT-kah  
yes, indeed, certainly

**2. Q: Iktah maika nem?**

What you name?

**A: Naika nem \_\_\_\_\_.**

**3. Q: Kah maika mitlite?**

Where you live/reside?

**A: Naika mitlite kopa \_\_\_\_\_.**

I live in/near \_\_\_\_\_.

**4. Q: Klaksta mamook okoke?**

Who made this?

**A: Naika mamook yaka.**

I made it.

**5. Q: Kahta maika tikegh okoke?**

Why you want that?

**A: Naika tikegh okoke.**

I like it.

**6. Q: Kunsih maika chako?**

When you come?

**A: Naika chako alta.**

I come now.

**7. Q: Kunsih tillicum mitlite?**

How many people live/there.

**A: Delate Hyiu.**

Very many.

**8. Q: Iktah muckamuck maika tikegh?**

What food you like?

**A: Naika tikegh muckamuck \_\_\_\_\_**

(use English word).

I like to eat \_\_\_\_\_.

**9. Q: Maika kumtux \_\_\_\_\_? (any name can go here)**

You know \_\_\_\_\_?

**A: Ahah, naika kumtux \_\_\_\_.**

*OR* Wake, naika halo kumtux \_\_\_\_\_.

Yes, I know \_\_\_\_\_.

*OR* No, I not know \_\_\_\_\_.
